Travelling to and from the hospital

By car

As there is limited parking on site, we encourage patients and visitors to use public transport wherever possible. However if you are travelling to the hospital by car, please note the following:

Directions – The hospital is best approached via the A30 Westbound. Follow the signs for West Lake and take the second exit at the Reservoir Roundabout. Then follow the red signs for 'Hospital'.

Parking – Please allow plenty of time to find a parking space, particularly in the mornings when the car park is extremely busy. Disabled parking (for Blue Badge holders only) is available in the bays alongside the Outpatients Department. PLEASE DO NOT PARK ON THE YELLOW LINES as this area must be kept clear for ambulances and other emergency vehicles.

Main Hospital Car Park Charges:

- First 20 minutes – free
- Up to 2 hours - £2.50
- 2-3 hours - £4.00
- 3-4 hours - £5.00
- 4-5 hours - £5.50
- Over 5 hours - £7.50

If you are likely to be visiting the hospital regularly, a weekly or monthly season ticket can be purchased from the Parking Office on the ground floor.

By bus

The hospital is well served by local buses, including the following routes: 282, 232, 114 and 36. All buses drop off and pick up at the central bus stops outside the main entrance of the hospital.

By rail

The nearest station is Reservoir Parkway, a 15 minute walk from the hospital.

By taxi

A freephone facility for ordering taxis can be found in the Accident and Emergency department.

CANAL RESTORATION PROJECT – NEW FOOTPATHS PLANNED

We are pleased to inform you that the long-awaited restoration of the Green Valley Canal has taken another step towards completion this weekend. At the Canal Restoration Society, we voted unanimously to go ahead with plans to build new footpaths adjacent to the canal.
